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Introduction

Adding the Records Secretary's job is not a huge amount of extra work, as I already have to keep detailed records to produce *Notts News* and the web site. If anything, the overall reporting of results should be speeded up.

Annual General Meeting

The minutes of the AGM (held on 11 July) will appear in due course; here's a brief round-up of the decisions made and the new officers.

The proposal to reconstitute the Finance Committee as an Executive Committee to run NCA affairs was approved. The Executive Committee will consist of the President, Secretary, Treasurer, League Secretary and Congress Director, along with other members co-opted to specific meetings to deal with individual activities, as necessary.

Consideration of a proposal to adopt a membership scheme similar to that of the recently trialled Northern Membership Scheme, which would replace the existing Game Fee system and result in NCA members also becoming members of the ECF, was deferred to a Special General Meeting to be held in September.

Trophies were presented to the Divisional champions, the County Champion (Michael Barnes) and the Winner of the Best Game prize (Robert Richmond). (The winning game appears at the end of this issue; you can also play through it on the NCA web site.)

Various officers stood down from their posts, and the President, Michael Barnes, had come to the end of his threeyear term, requiring new officers to be elected. Unusually, there were two candidates for the latter post, Maurice Hill (Nomads) and David Levens (West Nottingham). David Levens was elected by 17 votes to 4. All other posts attracted either a single candidate or remain vacant. The full list of new officers and vacancies is (from my notes, and subject to confirmation):

National Club Championship

Although Newark's interest in the National Minor ended in June (see *Notts News* No. 37), they will not have far to deliver the Plate Trophy won last year after Ashfield beat Westcliff (of Southend) by $2\frac{1}{2}-1\frac{1}{2}$ in the Final.

This was played at Syston and the Ashfield scores were:

Ashfield had beaten Wycombe and Hazlemere by a similar score in the semi-final when the winning side was Richard Webster, Bob Taylor, Malc Jackson and Paul Todd.

At one time all players had to be graded Under 125 for this event; nowadays the rules state that the average grade of the team needs to be less than 125.

County Championship Finals

The finals of the various County Championship events were held on I July. The UI50 title was won by Yorkshire, beating Notts' semi-final conquerors Cambridgeshire 10–6. In the UI25 event, Bedfordshire, who beat Notts in the quarterfinal, went on to win, beating Warwickshire $8\frac{1}{2}-7\frac{1}{2}$ in the final. Finally, the UI00 championship was won $6\frac{1}{2}-5\frac{1}{2}$ by Kent, who beat Norfolk (winners over Notts in the semi-final).

NCA Best Game Prize 2006


The winner of the Best Game Prize, Robert Richmond, has very kindly annotated the game for *Notts News*.

Robert Richmond – Glenn Halfpenny


Notts League Division I, II January 2006

I.d4 d5 2.c4 e6 3.Nc3 Be7 4.Bf4 (This bishop is going to be very powerful, controlling the b8 and c7 squares.) 4...Nf6 5.
e3 0-0 6.Rc1 c6 7.Nf3 Nbd7 8.h3 Qa5 9.Qb3 (Better than Qc2 – avoiding the possibility of the discovered check after dxc4, Bxc4, b5, b4 and b3.) 9...Ne4 10.Bd3 Nxc3 11.bxc3 a6 12.0-0 b5 13.c5 (Neither pawn capture promises much, and I judged the e5 break by Black to be 'difficult'.) 13...f5

(How do you assess this position? Black is cramped and has a very bad queen's bishop, but has seized space on the Q-side. White is better, but not obviously winning it would seem. However, I cannot find any better moves for Black in what follows. My initial thought was to play on the K-side and aim for e4 – however, on second thoughts...) **14.Ra1!** (Threatening a4.) **14...Bb7** (Trying to hold the Q-side. If bxa4 the black a-pawn is undefendable.) **15.a4 Qd8 16.axb5 axb5 17.c4!!**



(The Alekhine moment. In Alekhine–Bogoljubov, Nottingham (where else?) 1936, there was a similar unsupported pawn advance: 1. Nf3 d5 2. d4 Nf6 3. c4 c6 4. Nc3 dxc4 5. a4 e6 6. e4 Bb4 7. e5 Ne4 8. Qc2 Qd5 9. Be2 c5 10. O-O Nxc3 11. bxc3 cxd4 12. Nxd4 Bc5 13. Nf3 Nd7 14. Rd1 Qc6 15. Bxc4 O-O 16. Ng5 g6 17. Bb5 Qc7 18. Ne4 Be7 19. f4 Nc5 20. Nf6+ Bxf6 21. exf6 Bd7 22.
